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Dear Parents and Community Members:

We are pleased to present you with the Annual Education Report (AER) which provides key information on the 2013-14 educational progress for the Hanover-Horton School District and our schools. The AER addresses the complex reporting information required by Federal and some requirements of State laws. Our staff is available to help you understand this information. Please contact our principals and/or myself for help if you need assistance.

The report contains the following information:

Student Assessment Data – Elementary or middle school assessment results on the Michigan Educational Assessment Program (MEAP), high school assessment results on Michigan Merit Exam (MME), and assessment results for students with disabilities on Michigan's Alternative Assessment Program (MI-Access or MEAP-Access)

- Presents achievement data for all five tested subjects (mathematics, reading, science, social studies and writing) compared to targets for all students as well as subgroups of students.
- Helps parents understand achievement progress within schools and compare these to district and State achievement.

Accountability Scorecard – Detail Data and Status

Information is provided for the district and each school related to achievement targets in reading, writing, mathematics, science and social studies answering questions like:

- Did the district (and schools) meet achievement targets for all students and subgroups of students?
- Did the district (and schools) meet achievement growth targets for all students and subgroups of students?

Teacher Qualification Data

- Identifies teacher qualifications at district and school levels
- Reports percentage of core academic classes taught by teachers not considered highly qualified to teach such classes

NAEP Data (National Assessment of Educational Progress)

- Provides State results of the national assessment in mathematics and reading every other year in grades 4 and 8

Review the table below listing our schools. The state has identified some schools with the status of Reward, Focus or Priority. A Reward school is one that is outperforming other

schools in achievement, growth, or is performing better than other schools with a similar student population. A Focus school is one that has a large achievement gap in 30% of its student achievement scores. A Priority school is one whose achievement and growth is in the lowest 5% of all schools in the state. Some schools are not identified with any of these labels. In these cases no status label is given.

School Name	Status Label	Key initiative to accelerate achievement
Hanover-Horton Elementary School	None	Staff will continue to focus on initiative designed to improve the reading ability of our students.
Hanover-Horton Middle School	None	Teachers will focus on implementing strategies to improve student reading abilities.
Hanover-Horton High School	Reward	Staff will have students write in-depth responses to various genres of text on a regular basis.
Hanover-Horton Virtual School	None	Student progress will be monitored regularly.

During the 2013-2014 school year, our students demonstrated that our hard work is paying off. Our MEAP results showed more improvement than any other district in Jackson County for the second year in a row. This spring, our MME results not only showed significant improvement, but we also had the highest achievement of any district in the county. Again, this year, our buildings went through the Data Retreat process in order to analyze the achievement of our students. Through that process, buildings were able to pinpoint areas that are we are targeting for improvement. Staff spent time reviewing the latest research in order to implement the most effective strategies in their classrooms.
